- 4. Here is a little phrase to write if you're feeling ready for it: I can not nap.


#### Mathematical Development

Let's learn a little bit more about teen numbers!

Our Learning: Know that a teen number is made with ten and some ones

So, some of the children will be confident at recognising teen numbers and some will still be learning to do this. Let's deepen our knowledge by finding out a little bit more. As parents, you may have learnt about teen numbers by knowing that they are made with a ten and some units. These days, we refer to the 'units' as 'ones'. You'll need your teen number cards for the job today.

- 1. Watch the video about how teen numbers are made.
- 2. Print or make your own ten frames and gather some lego pieces or blocks.
- Place your teen number cards in a pile and pick one at a time. Make this number by filling your ten frame and then adding the ones in the second ten frame.
- 4. Repeat with different number cards. Your son or daughter may quickly realise that they don't need to alter the complete ten frame. That remains constant and it's just the 'ones' that need to be adjusted each time.
- 5. We've added a sheet of Numicon pieces. If you are able to, you could print these and use them for further exploration of teen numbers. Remember, packs of sheets are available at the office if needed.

## **Topic**
