This game is a bit of fun! You have to sound out and read the word. Then decide if it's treasure (a real word) or fake (a made up word) Have fun!


4. Have a go at the letters we've chosen for formation practice this week

That's enough for today... we'll be gentle with ourselves!


Mathematical Development

Our Learning: Recognising teen numbers



- Watch Mrs Grimes' video
- Your job today is to go on a teen number hunt. You can use the checklist or make your own. You could do this in many ways. If you're out and about on a walk, you could look for teen numbers in the environment. For example, look for door numbers. Or if you're in the house, you could set up a teen number hunt for your child. Hide teen number cards around the house and send your son or daughter off on a hunt to retrieve them. Then, tick each number off on the checklist.
- 3. If your child recognises the numbers easily, spend time ordering them. Then, once you have a number track, you can ask questions such as, find me a number that is more than 13. Or, find me the number that is two less than 15. But, if your child is struggling to recognise these numbers (and this is not uncommon), spend lots of time with a number line to 20 touch counting them in order together.
