Activity one:

You are going to use your skimming and scanning skills to check if the statements are <u>True</u> or <u>False</u>.

Activity two:

The easiest way to do this is look at the verb.

A **verb** is a main part of speech that is often used to describe or

indicate an action. Example: walk, talk, said...etc.

A lot of past tense verbs have the suffix -ed on them.

Tick to show whether each sentence is written in the past or present tense.


