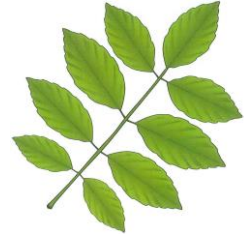

Feel Like Celebrating!

Our topics for this term are ...

Which celebrations happen at this time of year?

RE – The children will listen to the stories associated with different festivals and will find out how they are celebrated for example: Diwali, Hannukah and Christmas.

Geography – After learning about compass directions (north, south, east and west), the children will use maps to name the countries of the UK and then apply their map skills to find the location of Christmas stories they have been listening to from round the world.

Art – The children will find out about the life of W. Kandinsky as one of the first impressionist painters and explore the idea that he painted according to feeling rather than just by what he saw.

Science – The senses will provide the basis for our science work. The children will name parts of the body associated with the five senses then we will investigate how our senses work. We shall then use our senses to explore how the season is changing. We will bring our work on the senses together by planning a Christmas party appealing to all our senses.

Computing - Opportunities to reinforce e-safety will be ongoing and we will continue to use programs to support our classroom learning. Our focus will be word processing programs. The children will learn to create pictures and write text as well as learning to save, retrieve and print their work.

Music

Continue to find out about rhythm and beat through the 'Hey You' section of the Charanga online music scheme then we will be learning the songs for our Christmas Nativity and Christingle.



English:

English involves the development of speaking and listening, reading fluency, comprehension and writing skills. Children will have many opportunities to develop their reading and comprehension skills both in the classroom and during weekly guided reading sessions. They will also be able to apply their skills across other areas of the curriculum during their topic work. Over the course of the year, children will experience a range of narrative, non-fiction and poetry texts.

This half term, we intend to explore stories and non-fiction, and use vocabulary related to celebrations. Children are welcome to bring in books related to the topic.

Mathematics:

In KS1, our aim is to ensure that pupils develop confidence and mental fluency with number, counting and place value. Our learning begins in a very practical way before moving to more formal methods. Children will also explore shapes, measurements, position and direction.

The children's ability to 'reason' will be developed throughout all of their mathematical work as they are encouraged to explain how they have reached solutions to problems.

This half term, we will be focusing on addition and subtraction, including number bonds to 10 and counting in tens and 2-D shapes.

Homework & Spellings

Spellings: Spellings will be tested each **Tuesday**. New spellings will be given out on **Wednesdays**. The children will also get a maths skill to learn for eg. Number bonds to 10 or counting in twos. This will be set with the spellings.

Reading: Please ensure your child has read in time for their weekly Guided Reading session on a **Wednesday** so that they are able to participate fully. It also helps us out enormously if you have written a comment in their reading record each week. Please tell us if your child has found their reading book challenging or too easy. In addition, you could record their ability to understand the text and answer any questions you may have asked.

Other ways of helping your child:

- Visiting the library to look for books to support our topic.
- Using the Internet to research our topic.
